A GREAT SKATING CARNIVAL

Largest Attendance on Saturday Afternoon and Evening Ever Seen at an Acton Rink

Saturday was a gala day at the new rink. The weather was rather doubtful for assuring the best of ice, but its mildness was more conducive to attracting spectators.

In the afternoon a hockey match between the club of the Toronto office of Beardmore & Co., and the employees of the firm here, was quite a feature. The game was not very exciting as the Acton crowd rather outclassed the Toronto aggregation, but it had plenty of interest. The score was 6 to 3 in favour of the local boys. After the game supper was served to the Toronto hockeyists and their followers by the rink management.

The carnival in the evening was however, the 'big feature.' The whole town, countryside and neighbouring towns [were there]and ...

The spectators' benches and stands were crowded to capacity and fully two hundred appeared in costume on the ice. The costumes were elaborate and of every description imaginable.

During the evening fireworks were displayed and coloured searchlights and candles used in a pleasing lighting scheme. An excellent eight-piece band from Toronto furnished the music for the skaters and dancers until 11:15.

The moccasin dance was an innovation that seemed quite popular, although it is said that those who used rubbers instead of moccasins had much drier feet after their evening's indulgence.


ON-LINE EXHIBITION

A Time Without Turkeys

Catching sight of a flock of wild turkeys can be a real delight. The flashy springtime strut of iridescent toms (male turkeys) is as captivating for us as it is for the hens. Come winter, the silhouettes these prehistoric-looking birds cast against fields of freshly fallen snow is postcard worthy.

These creatures are a common yet charming feature of our rural landscape. With tens of thousands of wild turkeys now roaming Ontario, can you believe there was a time without them?

Although native to the region, the eastern wild turkey was considered locally extinct by 1909. Unregulated hunting, the cutting of native forests and development brought the population to zero. The turkeys we see roaming our

countryside today are the descendants of thousands of birds relocated from the United States in the 1980s as part of the Ministry of Natural Resources rehabilitation program.

Wild turkeys are important for ecosystem health and balance. They'll eat just about anything they find on the forest floor, from tree nuts, seeds and berries to mosses, ferns and bulbs, and even snails, insects and small amphibians. They're a traditional feature on our holiday dinner tables, and enjoyed equally by owls, foxes and coyotes. They also provide economic

and recreational value through hunting-related activities.

Turkeys enjoy landscapes with diverse plant species, including forested areas, wild fields and agricultural lands. These areas provide good nesting habitat and varied year-round food sources.

If you'd like to see more turkeys on your property, preserve the natural biodiversity of your woodlots and meadows. Plant trees that produce fruit, like native oaks, to ensure good food sources are available.

Wind storm produced tornado that passed through Glen Williams, Georgetown

Twister covered 3.7 kilometres

Last Sunday's wind storm that brought down trees produced a small tornado that passed directly through Glen Williams. The rare November tornado was confirmed by Northern Tornadoes Project (NTP), a Western University-based group that works to detect and document tornadoes across the country.

Based on damage patterns, NTP said the tornado touched down near Trafalgar Road, passed across Johnson Crescent, McCullough Crescent, Banting Road, Ruddell Crescent and the northern part of Joycelyn Crescent. It then crossed Highway 7 and followed a path along Wildwood Road. It crossed the intersection of Wildwood and Confederation Street in Glen Williams before dissipating near the end of Joseph Street in Glen Williams. Most of the damage reported was trees falling and some roof damage to houses. The tornado was classed as an EF1 (on the Fujita Scale which goes from EF0 to EF5), producing winds of 135 km/h, with a maximum width of 360 metres, according to NTP. It was the 41st tornado recorded in Ontario this year.
