### CHANGES IN ESQUESING TOWNSHIP

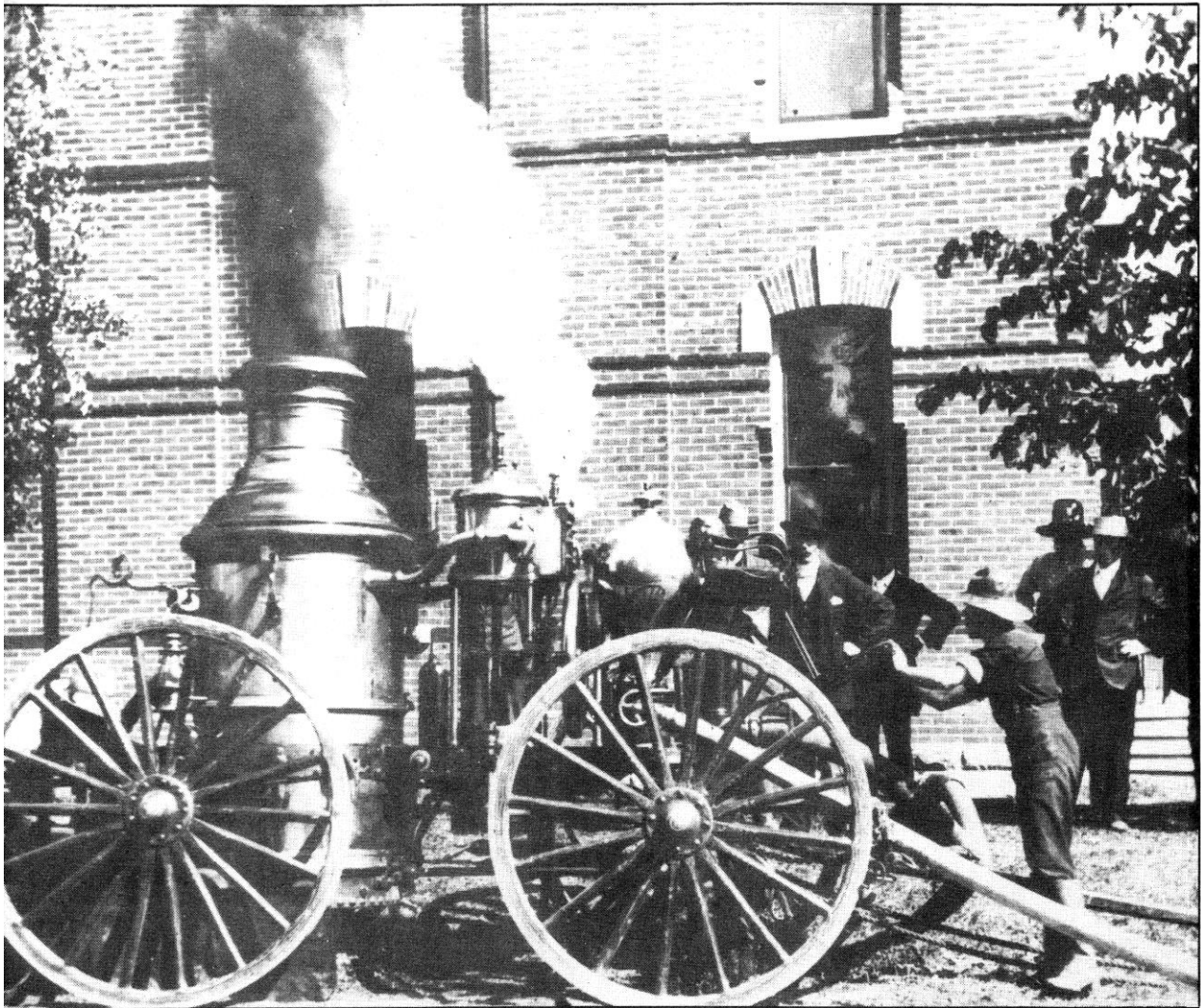

**BALLINAFAD HOTEL:** A warm welcome and a good drink awaited travellers at the Commercial Hotel on Trafalgar Road up until 1912.

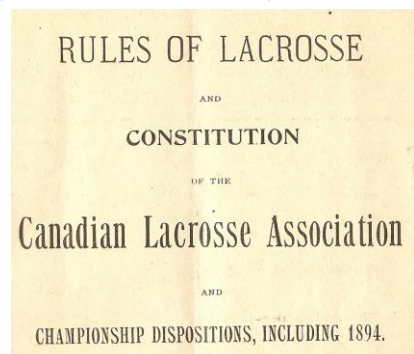




**ACTON FIRE BRIGADE:** The finest fire protection available was this steam-powered water pump! It was melted down in World War I.

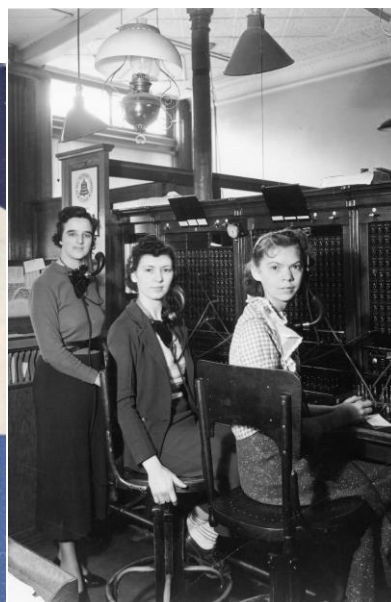

### EHS ARCHIVES

The 1856 School Section map has been sent for restoration. The project was described by Beverley King in the last newsletter. The restored map will hang in the History Room of the Georgetown Library.

We have been processing the many donations received this year – the Dills Family collection, items from Rose Anna Helson, the estate of Ruth McBride and Kathy Gastle. Items are added to our collection Finding Aid or the photograph collection.

As mentioned in an earlier newsletter, we received negatives taken at Smith and Stone in 1952, from the City of Toronto Archives. These have been processed and we're in the

process of taking them around town for identification. One has been added to Halton Images, featuring Jack Puckering, Jack Sunnecks, Roger Wilcox, Joe Wilcox, Harold Gilmour and Lloyd Dyers. It can be accessed by visiting this link at <http://images.halinet.on.ca/3612586/data?n=7>.

A series of 1955 street images of Acton, donated by the Bruce County Museum has also been added. The description for EHS25055 reads: **ACTON:** A policeman directs traffic at Mill and Willow streets. On the right is Gordon's Hardware, the post office, Baxter Drugs and the Bank of Nova Scotia. On the left is the Bank of Montreal and Cooper's Drugs. Printed on the image is "Mill Street looking East, Acton, Ont. 5"

A third interesting series are newspaper negatives of several movies filmed in this area. EHS25410 can be found on Halton Images with this description: **GLEN WILLIAMS** –A view of the Copper Kettle Pub remade into Pork Belly's General Store during the filming of the movie *The Legend of Gator Face*. The film, released in 1996 stars John White, Dan Warry-Smith and Charlotte Sullivan.

The display will be up for the remainder of the year, so have a look in the History Room



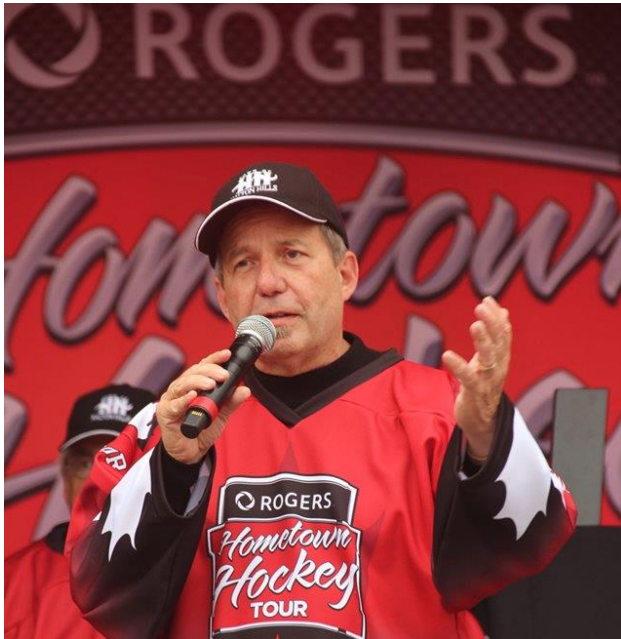
of the Georgetown branch of Halton Hills Library.

## LOCAL NEWS

### 195 YEARS AGO

*"Lord, how delightful 'tis to see  
A whole assembly worship thee."*  
There was a Presbyterian meeting at James Laidlaw's, in Esquesing, a few Sabbaths ago. Mr. King, the minister, was ill of the ague, and did not attend. The venerable host, cousin of the far famed Etherick Shepherd, and a contributor to Blackwood, opened the day's service with one of the psalms and tunes which the old covenanters used solemnly to chant in adverse troublous times, under the concave vault of the heavens, and which offered a chastened pleasure to the soul, whether sung in a Scottish kirk, or a Canadian log barn. Mr. Wm. Robertson presented – he has a fine tenor voice. In homely tone, Mr. L. read a long, long lecture, and then proposed that "Sandy" who sat at his elbow, should read another, which, as it contained in eight or ten closely printed octavo pages, he \_\_\_ tied a *short* one. The audience which consisted of a number of well-dressed Scotch families, (some of the fathers, in the short *inexpressibles*, and in use of the large knee buckles of yore) and several Canadians, were very attentive. "Sandy" finished his *short* discourse, and a third emigrant from the land of cakes gave us sermon the third. The exercise then concluded with a very harmonious concert of voices, who joined in singing HIS praise in a psalm, till, as they lifted the stave, the dense and lofty forests by which they were surrounded echoed back their melody. There was no organ nor flute wanted there. -*The Colonial Advocate*, 14 Oct., 1824

### 170 YEARS AGO

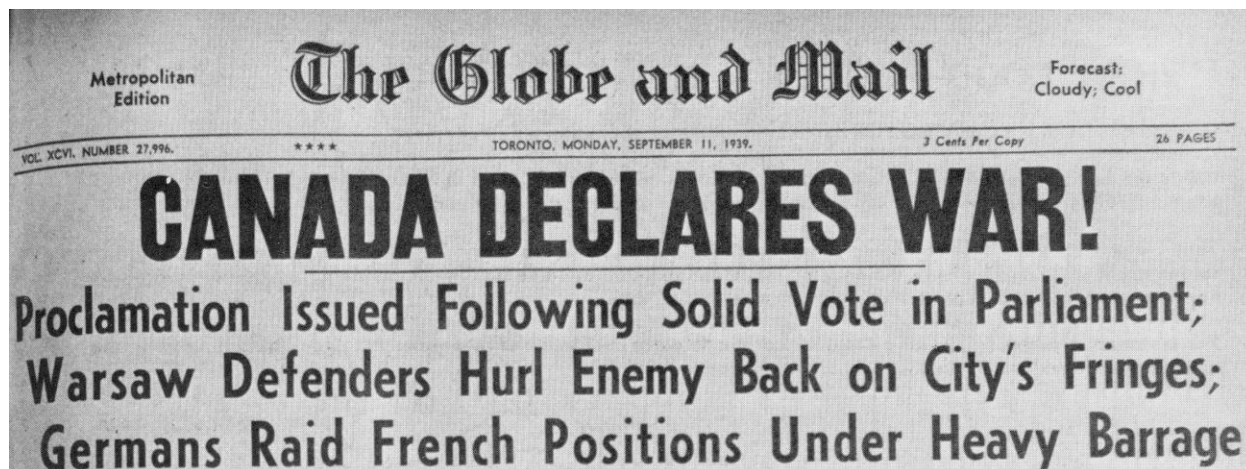
**Ploughing Match in Esquesing** – A ploughing match came off on the farm of Adam Sproat, Esq. of Esquesing on the 26<sup>th</sup> inst. There was a keen contest and the work was performed very creditably. First prize of £1 went to Francis Kent, 2<sup>nd</sup> to Thomas Gill and 3<sup>rd</sup> to John Stewart. Boys who won for their division were John Pickard, George Boomer and John Sproat jr. (*Spectator* 31 Oct. 1849)

### 160 YEARS AGO

**Cricket – Acton vs. Milton** – The return match between the Acton and Milton Junior Cricket Clubs, came off on the grounds of the latter, on Saturday last. The umpires, Messrs. Dunn and Thompson, pitched the wickets at 10 a.m., when the Captains B. Johnson, for Acton, and Jasper Martin for Milton, tossed for choice of innings... The game was a spirited one and went on very pleasantly until about 3 a.m. when the scorers announced...that the Miltonians had won. - *Halton New Era*, 11 Aug. 1859

### 150 YEARS AGO

**SACRED CONCERT** – According to announcement a Sacred Concert was given in St. Patrick's Church, Georgetown, on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. The affair was a grand success, the Church being packed to its upmost capacity with a very large and respectable audience. The vocalists performed several parts well, and all present were pleased with the entertainment. Miss Hannah Barber presided at the melodeon, in which her capacity her services were highly appreciated. The sum of \$50 was realized, which is sufficient to show that in a pecuniary point of view the concert was a success. *Halton Herald*, 7 January 1869
