THE CANADIAN FLAG DEBATE



The issue of a new Canadian flag has accomplished one thing – it has shoved Cyprus off the front pages of the newspapers and given us a topic on which everyone can have an opinion... And no matter what a new flag contains, be it Union Jacks, stars, stripes, maple leaves, beavers, wheat sheaves or trilliums, no one design will find favour with the large majority... We cannot speak for other provinces, nor even for our own, but listening to talk around town we would sum up Georgetown feeling this way. There is a hard core of residents who like the red ensign, don't want it

changed and will fight bitterly to retain it as national flag. There is another group who

might agree to a change only if a new design appeals to them. And there is a large group who have never given the flag too much thought, accepting it as we do other facets of life... - "Unnecessary Controversy," Walter C. Biehn, *Georgetown Herald*, 28 May 1964

It's now beginning to look more and more as though we may be waking up one of these mornings to find that we have a new flag whether we like it or not. While we still have some faith in the democratic form of government we believe we may end up with a flag not acceptable to a large majority of the Canadian citizens... We as citizens, if we favour the ensign, must fly it from our homes and places of business on

every public holiday and at every opportunity. Perhaps in this way, those of us who apparently have no public voice could speak with great emphasis. If you want the Red

Ensign, as we do, and we think you do, display it prominently and proudly. Otherwise some new, weird flag is going to be fluttering over the Post Office in the very near future. Victoria Day and Dominion Day this year may be the last chance we have. —"Showing the Flag...," David R. Dills, *Acton Free Press*, 30 April 1964

Halton's M.P. Harley Supports a New Flag

The Member of Parliament for this riding, Dr. Harry Harley, has declared himself a proponent of a 'distinctive Canadian flag' other than the Red Ensign.... He said in an interview that he would vote for the flag allegedly favoured by the Prime Minister, and the likeness of which appears on a Canadian stamp issued last week. He added, however, that while he approved of the three maple leaves in the centre he was tepid in regard to the blue stripes – one



NEW ROYAL TITLES ACT

SPROAT FAMILY LETTERS

Paul Sproat (St. Mary's, Ontario) and his cousin John Sproat (Kirkcudbright, Scotland) have completed 5 years of research based on 80 original letters in Paul's possession. Most of the letters were written between 1821 and 1860 to brothers Adam and John Sproat who left Scotland in 1821 and settled in the Scotch Block, Esquesing, near Milton, Ontario.

All 80 letters are included in the document. Each has been revised to be reader friendly. An appendix has been created for each letter with pertinent information relating to the letter.


INDIGENOUS HISTORY AND HERITAGE GATHERING

WILLIAMS & Co.'s HOSIERY MILL


When in 1824 the pioneer Mr. Chas. Williams hewed out a home for himself and family in the heavily wooded dell on the Credit River, a mile or more north of where Georgetown now stands, he little thought his then primitive settlement was destined in time to become a veritable hive of industry with a population numbering nearly seven hundred souls.

For several years after settlement the village bore the name of Williamsburg, in honour of its founder; but when it was found necessary to establish a post-office it was re-christened Glen Williams. The manufacturing interests of this thriving hamlet date from the erection, in 1825, of a saw mill, which was subsequently

followed by flouring and woollen mills. In 1878 the flour and saw mills passed into the possession of Mr. Joseph Williams. In January 1890, the flouring mill was destroyed by fire, and a year or so later the sawmill was reconstructed and converted into a mill for the manufacture of plain and fancy woollen and worsted hosiery of every description — boys knickerbockers being a specialty, as well as ladies' fine cashmere hose. There are about twenty hands employed in this mill, which is three and a half storeys high, and 40 by 60 feet in dimensions. Early in 1891 Mr. Charles E. Williams, a son of the senior proprietor, was admitted to a partnership, and at once installed as superintendent of production.

GLEN WOOLLEN MILLS

In June 1887, Messrs. John Sykes and Norman Ainley, both of whom were experienced old country mill operatives, located at Glen Williams, and established this, the largest industry, with the exception of the Georgetown Paper Mills, in this vicinity. In 1873 Mr. Sykes came from Hudderfield, Yorkshire, England, to Canada and was

manager of the Montreal Woollen Mills for five years, at the expiration of which time he removed to Weston, Ontario, to assume management of the woollen mills at that place, a position he relinquished to engage in the Glen Williams enterprise. Mr. Ainley, the junior partner, is also a native of Yorkshire. He removed to this country in 1880 and was employed under Mr. Sykes at Weston until the opening of the Glen mills. The main building is of stone, three storeys high, with mansard roof, and 50 by 100 feet in

dimensions. Adjoining the main building on the west is No. 2 mill, also of stone, two storeys high and 45 by 100feet in extent. In addition to the two buildings above mentioned there are five other stone and wooden structures, utilized as boiler house, engine room and warehouses. There are on average sixty hands employed here the year round in the manufacture of carpet yarns, tweeds, blankets, rugs and horse blanket linings. It is safe to say that there is not another similar industry in the Dominion that has run as many hours as these mills since their inception.




RESIDENCE OF J. SYKES AND N. AINLEY-Glen Williams.

F.W. Newman & Co. are agents for the Glen woollen mills for Quebec, the Maritime provinces and the North-west. The trade for Ontario is supplied directly from the mills. Both proprietors devote their entire time to the inspection and supervision of the mills. Mr. Alfred Sykes superintends the card rooms, while Mr. Harry Holdroyd has charge of the office.

BEAUMONT'S WOOLLEN MILLS

In 1873 Mr. S. Beaumont began the manufacture of woollen goods at Ancaster, Ont., but




S. BEAUMONT'S WOOLLEN MILLS-Glen Williams.

after several removals located permanently, in 1878, at Glen Williams and founded the enterprise now under consideration. Several structures are required to house this industry. The main building, illustrated in this issue, is of stone, three storeys high and 40 by 80 feet in dimensions; besides which there are two two-storey wooden buildings, one 35 by 60 feet, the


other 50 by 50 feet in extent. The product of these mills consists of knitted underwear, yarns and a high grade of ladies' and gentlemen's worsted and cashmere hosiery. As the mills are now running overtime, an addition to the plant will be made in the near future. In 1885 the business management of the concern was assumed by Mr. Joseph Beaumont, son of the proprietor, who is still at the head of affairs.

150 YEARS AGO - 1873 NEWS

- * GEORGETOWN BAND This band which has become quite an institution in Georgetown, will give its first annual concert on Friday 7th prox., when it is hoped there will be a large attendance. *-Canadian Champion*, 30 Jan. 1873
- * A new lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, to be known as Orion Lodge, is we understand, shortly to be instituted in Georgetown. *Canadian Champion*, 6 Mar 1873
- * We understand that the enterprising folk of Acton want to have their village incorporated. (*Canadian Champion*, 17 Apr, 1873)
- * The Queen's Birthday celebrated baseball Acton brass band gave promenade concert in the Drill Shed. (*Canadian Champion*, 29 May, 1873)
- * County Council on June 10th: Mr. Clay moved, seconded by Mr. Barber, That the petition of W.H. Storey and 130 others praying for the Council will pass a by-law to incorporate the Village of Acton into a separate municipality, be received, read and referred to a special committee. (*Cdn. Champion*, 12 June, 1873)
- * Acton, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville will celebrate Dominion Day. (*CC*, 26 June)
- * Erin Village Base Ball Club played Acton Victorias. (CC 31 July/73)
- * A short synopsis of the progress of the village of Acton may be interested to some of your readers. On passing up Mill Street, we come to the Glasgow House, run by Christie, Henderson & Co., the well-known Miltonians, ... Passing further up street, we come to the Canada Glove Works where some fifty hands find constant employment. The firm consists of W.H. Storey, D. McGarvin and Jas. Moore... Passing further up the street we come to the Acton Livery Stables by Ed Mathews, who is well-known

all over... Across the street from his place a neat roughcast building just put up reminds us it is the Acton Bakery... we come to the elegant new building to be christened the Acton Post Office and Town Hall, being built by our enterprising citizen, Jas. Matthews, P.M... another new enterprise, the Acton Drug store. (*Canadian Champion*, 7 Aug, 1873)
