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

SAMUEL KENNEDY HOUSE



Once you have made your house into your home, you have time to think about what came before – especially an older home. Pam Dickinson of 22 Sideroad did just that and after years of work produced a book entitled, "Our House and All the People Who Have called it Home." This frame house overlooking Silver Creek is connected to the pioneering Kennedy family. (EHS23975)

WHO WAS SAMUEL KENNEDY?

Samuel Kennedy (1797-1879) was the older brother of George Kennedy (1799-1870), founder of Georgetown. Samuel served in the 4th Lincoln Militia Company during the War of 1812, as a private. His sergeant was his older brother Charles Kennedy (1792-1854) who became a Provincial Land surveyor and surveyed this part of Esquesing Township. For his service he received the 200 acres of Lot 21, Concession 8. As a private Samuel only received 100 acres – the east half of Lot 22.


He married Hannah Stull about 1820 and they had seven children, all born here in Esquesing Township.





Boston Church 134th Anniversary Recalls Day When Pulpit a Maple Stump, Pews Cedar Logs

Boston Presbyterian Church, on the third line of Esquesing township north of the base line, held its 134th anniversary on Sunday, June 20, 1954. As in previous years, church was filled to capacity. Many descendants of the early settlers make a point of attending each anniversary of this lovely little country church. Perhaps, too, within the quiet precincts of the church, people of the Scotch Block think of the



time when services were held without benefit of a church; when the minister's pulpit was a maple stump and seats for the worshipper's rough pine logs.


Thus, it was one Sunday in June 1820, when a missionary preacher, the Rev. William Jenkins, came to minister to the people of Esquesing. The outdoor service was held on the farm of Andrew Laidlaw, Lot 6, Concession 4. At that time Esquesing was still very much a wilderness so the text that day was singularly appropriate – "And I will make with them a covenant of peace, and will cause the evil beasts to cease out of the land; and they shall dwell safely in the wilderness and sleep in the woods."

The next year the Rev. Abner Wright of Niagara held a service and

dispensed the Sacrament. Later the first session was formed and the following men appointed – John Stirrett, James Laidlaw Sr., Robert Shortreed, George Barbour, Thomas Barbour, George Darling, James Frazer and John Creighton.

On March 4, 1824, the Scottish fathers met together to consider the purchase of land as a burying-ground and for the site of a meeting house. Malcolm McNaughton was chairman and James McClaren, clerk. The committee agreed to purchase one and a half acres from Andrew Laidlaw. The purchase price to be £7/3/3 – not in cash but in good mercantile wheat, to be delivered to Mr. Laidlaw's farm or at Jasper Martin's mill by February 1, 1825...
